Lettering is one of the skills you might want to master for your Bullet Journal pages. I'm always in awe of the beautiful calligraphy people use to decorate their journal pages. What I quickly realized is that the secret to better lettering is of course practice, so I did my research and found tons of free resources and printable worksheets to improve this skill. Before we dive in though, here are some tips and materials to be sure you're ready to get going with your lettering. And of course, we have to start with stationery because boy or boy are there a lot of pens you can use for brush lettering! This post may contain affiliate links. Lettering Supplies The basic thing you need to know about pens you use for brush lettering is that they should have a flexible tip. Or at least have a possibility to create both thin and thick lines First of all, let's start with the most budget version which you might even have at home – Crayola Super Tips! Yes, these little devils can create the same brush calligraphy effects as any other brush pen, but for a much much lower cost. If you want to invest in a proper brush pen, don't go further than Tombow Dual Brush Pens. They are amazing, have tons of colors and most importantly – their brushes are very beginner-friendly Plus the marker tip will help you fix any small mistakes in your lettering you might make as a beginner. Sale Tombow 56185 Dual Brush Pen Art Markers, Bright, 10-Pack. Blendable, Brush and Fine Tip Markers Ideal for fine art, brush lettering, faux calligraphy, illustrations, water color illustrations, journaling and more!Set of 9 colors and 1 blender pen, with flexible brush tip and fine tip in one markerBRUSH TIP: Durable and flexible nylon fiber brush tip, creates medium or bold strokes by changing brush pressure You also might want to have a smaller brush pen, for more detailed work such as headers for your weekly spreads. Here is where you have a wonderful option of Tombow Fudenosuke pens. They come in hard and soft tips, so you can control the style of your lettering. There're also colored and neon versions of these brush pens, so you could add some more spark to your headers. I'd definitely say these pens are the best when you start learning calligraphy from zero. Brush Lettering Basics Hopefully, by now you have already all your supplies so let's get to lettering and the worksheets. If you want a deeper dive, be sure to check my post Brush Calligraphy For Beginners, but I thought we can go over some basics here as well. The basics of lettering are pretty simple – you just need to master the basic strokes. From there it will be easy – just use the variations of the basic strokes to form different letters. It's very important that you start from these and don't jump into letters straight away. If you start with letters instead of basic strokes, there is a chance your letters will be a bit wonky and it will be hard to see what exactly is off. It might sound very official and difficult, but don't worry – it's all pretty simple and once you master these strokes the letters will be so very easy to draw. It's all about practice and grinding, so just give yourself some time. Several main tips for brush lettering are: Hold your pen at a 45-degree angle. It will make sure that you can get thick and thin strokes without damaging the brush. Lift your pen up after each stroke. Lettering isn't writing so it's totally ok to lift the brush to help you create better-looking letters. Take your time. There is no rush, take your time when you letter and make sure you put a thought to your letters. How To Print Calligraphy Worksheets Before we dive into printable brush lettering practice sheets, I thought I should mention a few tips on how to print and use them, because I surely made a lot of mistakes with that myself and paid dearly for it. If you will be practicing your letters right in your worksheets, make sure you use high-quality printing paper (like this one), otherwise the paper might damage your pen and we never want that! Alternatively, you can also use any paper and just use a tracing paper sheet for practicing. That way you'll also be able to reuse your worksheets, plus tracing paper is much more affordable. My recommendation would be this marker paper or this tracing paper. Brush Lettering Basic Strokes Printable Worksheets Since practicing brush lettering starts from basic strokes, let's start with free basic stroke printables. You'll see that every creator has their own style so even brush strokes might look a bit different. It's not a problem – you can do any style you like. The important thing here is – keep all your strokes in the same style, particularly angled the same way. You can achieve that by using specially lined paper. I actually have the empty worksheets with lining that helps with brush lettering in the Resources Vault, so you can print that out and use it for practice. You can join in the form at the end of the post if you're not one of Planning Mashers yet. Make sure you get the one with the angle guide and make sure you put your basic strokes between the waist and baseline, the same goes for top letters. The ascender is for bigger letters like b or l. The descender is for letters like g or j. Before I give you the links I want to mention that these are from different creators so there is no one link to download them all. Just click on each name in bold pink and you'll be taken to a site to download the printables. And one more thing – I feel like you might want to learn a little bit more about the basic strokes and how to go through all these worksheets correctly. So be sure to watch this video by my favorite lettering artist Happy Ever Crafter. Ok, you're ready now so let's dive in and check out these practice sheets to rock your calligraphy skills. Free Lettering Started Guide by Missy Briggs Missy is a wonderful teacher and a practices calligrapher with several calligraphy books published. And hands down her worksheets with basic strokes are my favorites. A cool thing about these worksheets is that they don't just have basic strokes, but also a lot of theory and explanation on how to improve your strokes and master brush lettering. Basic Brush Lettering Strokes by Awesome Alice Awesome Alice has a lot of amazing lettering printables, there will be more featured below. But for beginners, the best is to start with these basic strokes. Basic Brush Lettering Brush Strokes Worksheet by Moms and Crafters I like these worksheets because they have a lot of interesting variations on the basic strokes we talked about above. Free Brush Pen Calligraphy Worksheet: Neat Slant Edition by The Postman's Knock This one includes slant basic strokes, as well as a sample alphabet. It has a more traditional calligraphy look to it, but the basic strokes are basic strokes. So it works even if you're going for a more modern calligraphy feel. Brush Lettering Basics – Free Worksheet by Scribbling Grace This worksheet includes all the basic strokes you need, as well as small and capital letters. Just remember before starting on letters you should master the basic strokes. Basic Strokes For Small Tip Brush Pens by Dawn Nicole Designs There is a difference in size between the large and small tips, so it's good to have worksheets for both. I love that Nicole also provides the files for digital lettering on your iPad. Basic Strokes For Large Tip Brush Pens by Dawn Nicole Designs Nicole has a lot of worksheets (and there will be more links to her resources). Again I love how she decided to include both small and bit tip brush pens worksheets. Not Your Average Drills by The Postman Knock If you ever get bored with your usual drills – just try out this worksheet! the main principles are the same but it feels very different and more fun. Basic Strokes by Kelly Leigh Creates She has a lot of lettering practice sheets, all you need is to sign up for her mailing list that will bring you lots of lettering resources. Free Basic Strokes Worksheet by Destination Decoration The strokes here are very basic, but of course, that's a good thing. I like the post itself as well since it provides a lot of interesting information on lettering. Free Brush Lettering Practice Sheet: Basic Strokes by Ebb and Flow This one includes basic strokes, but also just a grid to help you practice more. These are not the only printable calligraphy worksheets by the way, so keep on reading and you'll find so many more. Moreover, these worksheets are great for large tip brush pens, like Tombow Dual Brush. Free Uppercase Lettering Practice Sheets By Amanda Kay If you want to try your hand in uppercase – this worksheet is for you. Plus again you can use this one with large tip brush pens. 12 Page Brush Lettering Worksheet by Homeschool On 12 pages of lettering worksheets, that include the miniscule letters, as well as some phrases. I just wanted to mention here that even though there are many worksheets here for the alphabet, all of them are different and created in a different style. This worksheet includes miniscule and capital letters, as well as some basic strokes. You can use your large brush tip pens like Tombow Dual Brush Pens. Lowercase Brush Lettering Practice Sheet by Amy Latta Creations Lowercase brush pen lettering worksheet, this one is great for small tip brush pens. This one also comes with a file for Procreate to rock your digital brush lettering. Brush Lettering Practice Sheet by Liz On Call This one includes both miniscule and capital letters. The cool thing about these worksheets is that each letter inside is divided by basic strokes, so it will be significantly easier to practice them. 50 Ways To Letter The Alphabet Lettering Worksheets by Little Coffee Fox Shelby from Little Coffee Fox is a great master of lettering and of course, she has some awesome worksheets. These have a page for each letter, and each page has 50 ways to letter a certain letter of the alphabet. These include capital and miniscule letters, as well as some words you might want to letter in your Bullet Journal.
